PLANNING

- 1. What do I want to record (which language, variety, genre)? Why?
- a good project is specific (not just "record someone talking in Lx")
- 2. Whom do I want to record? Why?
- too close a relation (wife, sister) can be problematic
- **3. Where** can I do the recording?
- 4. What do I need?
- Films, prompts => check out before the recording!
- Does the speaker have to prepare before? (for example, recalling a story, a recipe)

PLANNING

5. Which equipment?

- good quality and not intrusive: mobile phone with application for recording in wave quality; recording into PC is often of bad quality
- check the equipment before the recording!!
- 6. Which **metadata** do I want to collect?
- 7. What kind of **consent** (form) do I need?

RECORDING

- Know your equipment!
- If possible, make a sound check.
- When is a good moment to ask for consent?
- Be aware of your role(s) in this interaction.
- Know your prompts (films, pictures) and what you want to use them for.
- Instruct the speaker properly to make sure you elicit what you want to elicit (examples: pear story, cut-and-break videos).
- Be open for changes of your initial plan.

RECORDING CERTAIN DISCOURSE TYPES

- Interview vs. conversation
- Narration vs. description
- Traditional narratives (stories, legends, myths)
- Instructions
- Monologues about a topic

Problems with recording dialect

CONSENT FORMS

- Consent in language documentation vs. consent for participating in experiment, studies
- Consent forms should be specific for a given project.
- ❖ A good consent form is clear, comprehensive, concrete but short ☺
- The name of the person signing the form must be contained (in legible form).
- The name of the researcher should be contained.

FILES AND FILENAMES

- Check the recording before storing and processing it! Note problems (e.g. background noises, unknown persons entering)!
- File formats for different purposes; original recording vs. cuts.
- About cutting and why it may be worth making longer recordings.
- File names

METADATA

- Be aware of different levels, and structure your metadata collection!
- It must be clear to what metadata apply (a project, a session, a file)!

The speaker(s)

- Name (real), abbreviation/nick (note demand of anonymity)
- Age (or date of birth), sex
- Languages, region of origin, occupation ...

The session:

- Time and place, environment
- Participants
- Equipment
- Language(s)

Each file

- Relation to <u>session</u> and participants (<u>speaker</u>)
- File name
- Type (audio recording, text, ...)
- Format may be clear from extension (.wav, .txt...)
- Length (for audios)
- Content: genre, topic, description

HOW TO WRITE A REPORT (THAT WILL PLEASE THE TEACHER)

Filename

- bad: «ReportMetadata.pdf», «DocumentaryLinguistics.pdf», «Task2.pdf», «task 2 metadata n stuff.pdf»
- better: «Report Alessandra Bartolacci.pdf», «Kasperek Task2.pdf», «Report_MartaDec_Task2.pdf»

Structure

- Title (what is this?) and name of the student on top of the page
- Introduction (may be just one sentence) what is this about
- Logical structure, visible

CONTENT OF THE REPORT

- Purpose of the recording, plan
- Choice of speaker(s) and setting
- Equipment
- Elicitation technique
- Obtained discourse type(s)
- File naming
- Choice of metadata and consent form
- Evaluation of the result
